

# **APA Style Guide for References**

Examples are based on the *Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association*, 6<sup>th</sup> edition (in the library under call number BF 76.7 P83 2010 in Reference Books & at the Reference Desk).

#### General Guidelines for all Sources

- If you cannot find all the information shown in an example, cite what is available.
- APA requires a hanging indent and **double spacing** throughout the reference list.
- Arrange entries in reference list in alphabetical order by the last name of the first author.

## **Book**

Author Last Name, Initial(s). (Publication year). *Title of book*. Location of publication: Publisher.

Abheim, R. (1971). Art and visual perception (2<sup>nd</sup> ed.). Berkeley, CA: University of California Press.

Olvord, L. A., & Van Pelt, E. C. (1999). The scalpel and the silver bear. New York, NY: Bantam.

## **Book with Corporate Author**

Institute of Financial Education. (1982). *Managing personal funds*. Chicago, IL: Midwestern.

## **Edited Book**

Letheridge, S. & Cannon, C. R. (Eds.). (1980). *Bilingual education: Teaching English as a second language*. New York, NY: Prager.

### Chapter in an Edited Book or an Anthology

Rubenstein, J. P. (1967). Effects of media violence on children. In B. Kane (Ed.), *Television & juvenile* psychological development (pp. 112-134). New York, NY: American Psychological Society.

#### <u>eBook</u>

Bornstein, M. H. & Lamb, M. E. (Eds.). (1999). *Developmental psychology: An advanced textbook* (4<sup>th</sup> ed.). Mahwah, NJ: Lawrence Erlbaum. Retrieved from http://www.ebscohost.com

Website When a document is on multiple pages, link to the *home page* for the document.

Author Last Name, Initial(s). (Publication date/year). Title of site/document. Retrieved from URL

# **APA Style Guide for References, Page 2 : Periodicals**

## **Journal Article**



Author Last Name, Initial(s), additional authors in same format (Year). Title of article.

*Title of Journal, Volume number*(Issue number if available), page number(s).

Brown, E. (1996). The lake of seduction: Silence, hysteria, and the space of feminist theatre. *Journal of Theatre and Drama*, *54*(3), 175-200.

Kralj, M. M. (1994). Out of the box. Consulting Psychology Journal: Practice and Research, 46(2), 27-28.

## Journal Article from Electronic Database (such as ProQuest, EBSCO, etc.)

In general, it is not necessary to include database information. Journal coverage in a particular database may change over time; also, no retrieval date is necessary.

DO NOT include in list of References. Cite source *in the text* of your paper with the following format:
